California Dept of Transportation – Transportation Enhancements (T.E.): California receives approximately 70 million per year for the Transportation Enhancements Program. Funded activities must have a direct relationship – by function, proximity or impact – to the surface transportation system and must be over and above normal projects, including mitigation. Eligible activities are facilities for pedestrians and bicycles, safety and educational activities for pedestrians and bicyclists, acquisition of scenic easements and scenic or historic sites, scenic or historic highway programs, landscaping and other scenic

beautification, historic preservation, rehabilitation and operation of historic transportation buildings, structures or facilities, preservation of abandoned railway corridors, control and removal of outdoor advertising, archaeological planning and research, environmental mitigation to address water pollution due to highway runoff or reduce vehicle-caused wildlife mortality while maintaining habitat connectivity, establishment of transportation museums.

USDA, Rural Development - Community Facilities Loans and Grants: The goal of USDA's Rural Development mission area is to help the people of rural America develop sustainable communities and improve their quality of life. It is working to eliminate substandard housing, create jobs, and build/improve community facilities. Examples of essential community facilities include health care, telecommunications, public safety, and public services. Grants are authorized on a graduated scale, with priority given to applicants in rural communities with populations of 5,000 or less. Applicants with low median household incomes receive a higher percentage of the grants. The maximum term for all loans is 40 years. Grant assistance may be available for up to 75% of project costs. Applications are available year-round for commercial lenders and non-profit groups, but some groups (ex. schools, libraries, non-profit hospitals,

etc.) must compete annually at the national level. Typical funding ranges from \$15,000 to \$40,000 for some and from \$100,000 to \$6 million for others. Please contact James W.
